#### 10. Public Hearings

10.1: Introduce and Waive the First Reading of an Ordinance amending a Development Agreement between the City of Oakdale and MDS Business Services, Inc. for the purpose of amending and extending the current agreement.

City Manager Whitemyer provided a staff report and PowerPoint Presentation on an Amended and Restated Agreement between the City of Oakdale and MDS Business Services, Inc. He provided a history on Ordinance No. 1255 which established a Cannabis Business Pilot Program and the Development Agreement developed at that time between the City and MDS Business Services, Inc. (Ordinance No. 1258). The Development Agreement went into effect on March 23, 2018 and consisted of a three (3) year term. He also discussed the One-Time Enforcement Cannabis Impact Fee and monthly Cannabis Dispensary Public Benefit fees.

City Manager Whitemyer then reviewed the Proposed Development Agreement terms stating that MDS Business Services, Inc. would like to extend their Development Agreement with the City of Oakdale but no longer desired to pursue the "Microbusiness" component of their business and would only focus on the retail cannabis dispensary. He provided information on the Public Hearing the Planning Commission held on May 5, 2021 stating that the Planning Commission, by a vote of 4-0, recommended the City Council adopt Ordinance No. 2021-1275. City Manager Whitemyer concluded his report stating that proposed Development Agreement term would be for ten (10) years and requested the Council approve the introduction and first reading of Ordinance No. 2021-1275 amending and extending a Development Agreement between the City of Oakdale and MDS Business Services for a period of ten (10) years.

City Manager Whitemyer answered questions from the City Council.

10.2: Introduce and Waive the First Reading of an Ordinance amending a Development Agreement between the City of Oakdale and Cal Kosher, Inc. and Empire Wellness for the purpose of amending and extending the current agreement.

City Manager Whitemyer provided a staff report and PowerPoint Presentation on an Amended and Restated Agreement between the City of Oakdale and MDS Business Services, Inc. He discussed the Development Agreement between the City and JDI Farms, Inc., now operating as Cali Kosher, Inc. and Empire Wellness, Inc., (Ordinance No. 1257) stating the Development Agreement went into effect on March 23, 2018, consisted of a three (3) year term, and set for the ability for the business to operate a retail cannabis dispensary and cannabis "Microbusiness." He reviewed the Development Agreement Terms and discussed the One-Time Enforcement Cannabis Impact Fee and monthly Cannabis Dispensary Public Benefit fees.

City Manager Whitemyer then reviewed the Proposed Development Agreement stating the proposed Development Agreement would be for ten (10) years, the operation of the



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dispensary, Empire Health and Wellness, would continue at the 633 Armstrong Way location, project parcels and boundaries of the manufacturing and cultivation business (517/547 Armstrong Way) would be clarified, and they would obtain additional State Cannabis licenses: Type 7 (manufacturing) and two (2) Type 3a (cultivation). He provided a map showing the proposed locations of the manufacturing portion and cultivation areas and then reviewed the monthly Cannabis Dispensary Public Benefit Fee for the proposed Development Agreement.

City Manager Whitemyer discussed the Public Hearing the Planning Commission held on May 5, 2021 stating that the Planning Commission, by a vote of 4-0, recommended the City Council adopt Ordinance No. 2021-1276. He concluded his report requesting the City Council approve the introduction and first reading of Ordinance No. 2021-1276 amending and extending a Development Agreement between the City of Oakdale and Cali Kosher, Inc. and Empire Wellness, Inc. for a period of ten (10) years.

City Manager Whitemyer responded to questions from the City Council.

#### 11. Staff Reports

11.1: Consider a location change to the proposed Maag Avenue dog park.

Public Services Director Gravel provided a staff report and PowerPoint Presentation on a location change to the proposed Maag Avenue dog park. He discussed various potential issues with the current location including storm drain issues and dog park activities in relation to Jr. High School operations. Director Gravel stated that on June 16, 2021, this item was brought before the Planning Commission and the Commission voted 5-0 in support of recommending to the City Council, the location change to the new area at the basin located at the corner of G Street and Maag Avenue. He concluded his report asking the City Council approve by minute order, a location change to the proposed Maag Avenue dog park.

11.9: Consider a Resolution supporting and authorizing the extension of the Abandoned Vehicle Abatement (AVA) Program fee through April 30, 2032.



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Police Chief Heller provided a staff report presentation on the Abandoned Vehicle Abatement (AVA) Program. Chief Heller provided a history of the AVA Program, how it is funded and the contributions it has made to the local quality of life by removing thousands of junked or abandoned vehicles from cities and the County. He stated that the current AVA Program fee is set to expire on April 30, 2022 but that the fee may be extended in increments of up to ten (10) years if the Stanislaus County Board of Supervisors and a majority of the cities having a majority of the incorporated population within the county adopt resolutions providing for the extension of the fee.

Chief Heller concluded his presentation requesting the City Council approve a Resolution supporting and authorizing the extension of the Abandoned Vehicle Abatement (AVA) Program fee through April 30, 2032.

Staff responded to comments from the City Council.

Mayor Bairos opened public comment.

Public comment was received from Alice Garcia who had a complaint regarding the excessive vehicles parked in her neighborhood.

11.10: Consider a Resolution adopting the Preliminary Fiscal Year (FY) 2021/2022 Annual Budget.

City Manager Bryan Whitemyer presented the staff report and PowerPoint presentation of the preliminary annual budget for FY 2021-2022 which contains over 80 separate fund accounts, most of which have designated rules for expenditures by law. He stated that



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the largest of the City fund accounts are the Water, Sewer and General Funds and that the General Fund contains the discretionary funds for which Council determines expenditures.

City Manager Whitemyer discussed challenges related to the COVID-19 pandemic and stated that despite those challenges, property tax and sales tax receipts for FY 2021-2022 were projected to increase by about \$250,000. He also talked about the Cannabis Fund and that this budget proposes using \$262,179 from those funds to cover cost increases associated with law enforcement and fire services. He explained that as a result of these revenue increases and other measures, the FY 2021-2022 Preliminary Budget projects that General Fund revenues will slightly exceed General Fund expenditures by \$12,108 despite expenditure increases of \$487,254. The main cost increases were the result of new agreements with City Labor Groups, rising costs associated with CalPERS, and the planned Year 3 cost increase of the Fire Services Contract with Modesto Fire Department. He also discussed Measure H funding and provided a breakdown of Measure H expenditures for the FY 2020-2021.

City Manager Whitemyer concluded his presentation requesting the City Council adopt a Resolution adopting the Preliminary Fiscal Year (FY) 2021/2022 Annual Budget.

Staff responded to questions from the City Council.

With no further questions, Mayor Bairos opened the item for public comment. With no public comment, Mayor Bairos closed public comment and asked the City Council for a motion to be made on this item.


